Bristol Early Childhood Alliance

Formed 9 years ago, Bristol Early Childhood Alliance's Appetite for Reading Program shares the love of reading by getting books into the hands of kids throughout Bristol. This effort has grown to include 11 bookshelves at area restaraunts, ice cream parlors, pediatrician offices, nonprofits and local businesses. Between July 1, 2016 and June 30, 2017, 8,034 books have flown off the shelves, and into the hands of kids and families.

Kids in the Middle

Five middle schools from Bristol, Burlington, Plainville and Plymouth operated a Kids in the Middle (KIM) program, with 438 students completing 4,167 hours of community service. In Fall 2016, KIM students from the four towns joined together at Winding Trails to learn problem-solving and leadership skills and break down stereotypes, thanks to a grant from Thomaston Savings Bank. In the Spring of 2017, KIM kids from Bristol, Burlington, Plainville & Plymouth gathered at the Barnes Nature Center for a wrap-up celebration, filled with problem-solving and leadership-building games and activities.

Youth Board

Thirty students from all 6 local high schools met monthly to discuss issues, raise awareness, and volunteer during local events, such as the Day of Caring and the Children's Reverse Parade. They also raised funds for the United Way through the Charity Cycling Challenge.

The students organized and volunteered at a Senior Citizen Prom at the Bristol Senior Center - which brought over 100 seniors from local and surrounding towns for an Italian-themed Prom Night.

Joy of Sharing Toy & Food Drive

Over 52 businesses, organizations and individuals donated food or toys during our Joy of Sharing drive. These were distributed to families in the community through 21 partnering organizations, making the holidays bright for many local children.

In May 2017, United Way added a Joy of Sharing Summer Food Drive to help restrock local food pantries during a time of year when their food supplies are often low.

Income

Adopt-A-Child Back to School Program

Through the generosity of over 48 organizations and many individuals and families, 550 local children from Bristol, Burlington, Plainville and Plymouth received a new outfit, backpack, and school supplies for the first day of school. On September 17, 2016, Bristol Firefighters, Police, Teachers and EMTs organized a "We Are One" Softball Tournament and hundreds of school supplies were donated. United Way distributed the many donations to children in need in Bristol schools.

Bristol Task Force to End Family Homelessness

The Bristol Task Force to End Family Homelessness works collaboratively to build a homelessness response and prevention system that meets the dynamic conditions of human need. The Task Force includes over 50 individuals and representatives of more than 20 organizations, who meet monthly to plan, advocate and take actions to prevent and to resolve local housing problems and needs of people in Bristol experiencing homelessness or at risk of becoming homeless.

Financial Coaching

Five new participants built their families' financial stability by participating in one-on-one coaching sessions. All increased their financial knowledge and improved their family's financial stability, as evidenced by the completion of family budgets, pre- and post-tests and moving forward with their identified financial goals. Eight new financial coaches completed training in August 2016, through a Main Street Community Foundation grant.

Financial Education Classes

Classes were offered in partnership with the CT Money School on topics including budgeting and stretching dollars, the financial implications of divorce, and financial recovery. Thirty-two individuals were able to grow their knowledge of financial literacy, moving towards improved financial stability for their families. 4 of these individuals attended multiple courses, demonstrating their commitment to strengthening their family's economic stability and reaching their financial goals.

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) Program

For the 8th year running, free income tax preparation was offered twice weekly throughout the tax season at the United Way office. Twenty volunteers filed over 492 returns, saving low to moderate income families over \$121,000 in tax preparation fees. The average refund was \$1,428. \$676,991 were returned to the community through Federal & State refunds last year alone. 94% of clients surveyed reported being "very satisfied with the service they received". Beyond receiving tax preparation services, VITA clients also receive information and referral to a variety of local asset-building resources.

There were 12,022 requests for service referrals from 10,236 calls from July 1, 2016 - June 30, 2017 from the towns of Bristol, Burlington, Plainville and Plymouth.

The top ten requests were for: Mental Health & Addictions (6,274) Housing & Shelter (1,855) Healthcare (910) Utilities (699) Employment & Income (692) Other (563) Food (377) Government & Legal (342) Clothing & Household (106) Transportation Assistance (103) Of the mental health and addiction services:



4,758 requests were made for mental health services; 1,202 were for crisis intervention and suicide; 301 were for substance abuse and addiction; and 13 were for mental health facilities.

FamilyWize Prescription Discount Program

In 2017, 757 people in our area used this free discount card to reduce the cost of their prescriptions, resulting in total savings of \$54,781.

West Central CT TRIAD The West Central CT TRIAD strives to strengthen community partnerships that help improve the quality of life, health and safety of older residents of Bristol, Burlington, Plainville and Plymouth/Terryville. Over 15 volunteers meet regularly to address Senior Issues through our SALT Council (Seniors And Law Enforcement Together), including members of law enforcement, organizations that serve seniors and older (more experienced!) adult volunteers.

Over 120 seniors came to the Plainville Senior Center for the 5th Annual TRIAD Spring Conference, "Cognition & Creativity: The Power of Lifelong Learning and the Arts". Speakers included Dr. Margarita Reyes (shown left) of Bristol Hospital and Thomas Hayden of the Alzheimer's Resource Center. Attendees got to experience a variety of activities including Big Brain Academy, coloring and crosswords, vision collage, relaxation and art. Attendees got to participate in a Functional Fitness demonstration and a Drum Circle, share a healthy lunch and hear about many resources available in the community.
